There is now an ALT conservation area within 12 miles of all county residents; and last year we added 121 acres to our protected lands, and educated more than 7,000 people on the importance of protecting our natural environment. Yet, there is so much more conservation work to be done.

We have accomplished this vital work over the years with terrific volunteer support and financial contributions from many individuals, but we have never offered a defined membership program; that is, until now.

Meet A Steward:

Ann "Fluff" Berger

Opportunities to connect people to our conservation areas come in a variety of forms. New supporters learn about the work that Allegheny Land Trust is doing in the region through meeting a staff member at an event, stumbling upon a new green space, or catching a story online.

Often when someone learns about the work we do they want to help and they can do so in a variety of ways-- through membership, direct donations or in-kind donations, and through volunteering.

Many of our volunteers and supporters are people who use the lands we protect for passive recreation or for hunting and fishing, like the Allison Park Sportsmen Club that we featured in last quarter's VISTAS. When we encounter a long-time visitor on the land who is interested in volunteering, it's often easy to get them started; most visitors don't even realize they're already doing quite a bit of volunteer work while simply doing what they enjoy. This month's steward is an example of just that!

Ann "Fluff" Berger is Secretary, Board member, and an Identifier for the Western

Pennsylvania Mushroom Club (WPMC), a group that has partnered with ALT to led Mushroom ID Walks on Sycamore Island for several years. An avid outdoor explorer and nature enthusiast she became a Land Steward for Linbrook Woodlands after hearing a presentation at a WPMC meeting.

This year, Ann will be leading Fungus Among Us events at Linbrook Woodlands. "(ALT's) commitment to preserving and restoring green spaces impressed me. When I saw on their website that ALT wanted to catalogue the different species at Linbrook Woodlands, which is near my home, I was excited to get out there with my camera," she said.

Fluff volunteers her time helping to inventory species at Linbrook Woodlands, which helps ALT learn more about the conservation area's health while also helping others learn what they can see while visiting.

She also helps us to monitor the land by reporting on trail conditions and potential hazards like fallen trees; things that are challenging for us to keep up on each conservation area.

"Since I enjoy hiking, taking photos of my

surroundings only adds to the pleasure of being in nature. I've been photographing fungi, plants, insects, and snakes—anything that will sit still long enough to get a clear picture, which I then post to ALT's project on iNaturalist. Knowing the diversity of life indigent to Linbrook Woodlands may help ALT make decisions about how to manage the land to best serve the natural population of its wild creatures."

Many people use our lands, but not everyone commits to making a difference in helping to conserve and steward local land.

When asked why land conservation is important to her, Fluff says "Land conservation is part of the good stewardship (with which) we've been entrusted on this planet. I believe we are made to live in harmony with the natural world, neither abusing it to extinction nor, at the other end of the spectrum, living completely at its mercy. Nature provides us with clean air and water, food, serenity in a shady forest or thrills riding upon Class V rapids, and many other means for our physical and mental health. Taking care of the land and the water is inevitably taking care of ourselves. I hope to do my part."

At ALT, our environmental education team hopes to enhance each visitor's trip to an ALT conservation area by providing more insight on what's found on the land. Whether you're a student, an educator, or simply a curious explorer, our Environmental Education Team is running programming to illuminate your experience of nature.

Now, ALT's Environmental Education Team is excited to announce that some of our upcoming programs will be run at low or no cost thanks to a variety of funders.

Thanks to an Environmental Education Mini Grant from the PA Department of Environmental Protection we'll be offering three workshops on August 1, 8 and 15 for early childhood educators for free! Watering Your Garden of Knowledge will take place as three workshops each based on activities designed to help educators feel more comfortable utilizing nature and water in the early childhood classroom. Participants will explore books, crafts, experiments, sensory activities and even explore three different ALT conservation areas (one per workshop)! Goodie bags

Thanks to an environmental education grant from Pennsylvania American Water, we'll be offering a stream monitoring training at Dead Man's Hollow near Boston, PA; visit our website for details to come. The stream monitoring training will be accompanied by a volunteer forest clean up in Dead Man's Hollow in partnership with Allegheny Cleanways.

Additionally, we will be offering free early childhood programming to K-2nd grade students in southern Allegheny County, and in southern and eastern Washington and Greene Counties thanks to a generous grant from the EQT Foundation. These early childhood programs bring nature and conservation topics into the classroom through our Science Sprouts program. Utilizing STEM concepts, students explore topics using stories, engineering, problem solving and play! Contact us to bring this program to your school.

Become A Community Conservationist, Connect Us with Land

Do you own, or are you aware of a treasured parcel of green space or farm in your community that you'd love to see protected from ever being developed? If so, we can help.

After protecting 4 parcels totaling 121 acres last year, ALT is on the lookout for new properties meeting our GREENPRINT criteria of scenic character, biological quality, and lands that have good water quality or can help to reduce flooding.

Many of ALT's conservation areas were protected as a result of a friend or neighbor introducing us to the land owner. In those cases, the landowner was previously unaware of ALT, and were pleased to learn that they had alternatives to selling their land to a developer. This is community conservation at its finest.

You can be a Community Conservationist

and help to protect land by keeping an eye out for FOR SALE signs, or if you know an owner of a large tract of land and feel comfortable asking, inquire about their thoughts and plans about the future of their land. People love to talk about their land and hear others compliment them on how beautiful it is, and how important it is to the community as green space.

As a landowner, you're doing your community a service when working directly with a nonprofit to support local efforts of land conservation. Additionally, working directly with ALT can save a landowner up to 7% of the real estate transaction fees.

Furthermore, if the land is in the County Clean and Green program, back taxes and penalties are avoided if the land is transferred to a land trust. ALT can also provide options to landowners that are eligible for federal tax deductions. And, we can work with landowners or their financial planner to integrate the disposition of real estate

holdings into an estate plan or will.

You don't need to become an expert in any of these areas. All you need to do is help us make the connection with the land owner before it's too late. We've heard many times from land owners, "I wish I knew about ALT before I sold my land to a developer." According to the Brookings Institute, Southwestern PA is losing 40 acres of land a day to development. Help ALT balance this trend by supporting local land protection.


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
